Introduction

This directory represent the Bureau of Prisons' (Bureau) contract facilities for juveniles.

The Bureau enters into agreements with tribal, state, and local governments, and into contracts with private organization, to provide for secure and non-secure services. Contractors are responsible for ensuring the safety, care, security, control, accountability, and custody of juvenile offenders. They also provide public protection through a system of written policies, procedures, and practices that are based on recognized juvenile correctional principles. Contracts are overseen by Bureau community corrections staff through on-site monitoring visits for the purpose of evaluating performance and service delivery.

This directory serves as a resource and is organized by region, secure and non-secure facilities. It identifies contract programs that meet the needs of federally sentenced juvenile offenders. The Bureau requires that formal programming be meaningful, measurable, and responsive to the educational, cultural, emotional, physical, and spiritual needs of juveniles. Programming elements must be written, individualized and include short-term and long-term correctional objectives which are realistic and achievable.

These facilities are required to provide an initial medical and mental health screening of each juvenile within 24 hours of arrival and a complete physical and mental health assessment within two weeks. The assessments must be administered by properly trained and qualified staff. Assessments serve as the basis for the development of an Individualized Program Plan that addresses basic and specialized treatment needs. Unlike basic correctional therapy, specialized treatment requires more intensive services for juveniles with special identifiable needs resulting from assessments and/or clinical diagnosis.

DEFINITIONS

FACILITIES

✓ **Secure:** A facility that is required to maintain a secure perimeter to ensure juvenile offenders remain within the facility and prevent access by the general public without appropriate authorization. Although a secure perimeter such as a fence(s) may be utilized and security further enhanced by electronic surveillance, it is not considered a substitute for the direct supervision of juveniles. The Bureau makes the determination of what constitutes a secure facility.

✓ **Non-Secure:** The terms "non-secure", "staff secure", "community-based", and "juvenile community residential" are used interchangeably to describe a facility that does not have a secure perimeter. This type of facility provides reintegration for juvenile offenders by allowing them access to the community for treatment and other correctional objectives. The Bureau makes the determination of what constitutes a non-secure juvenile facility.

SPECIALIZED TREATMENT

✓ **Sex Offender:** Treatment based on a cognitive-behavioral and relapse prevention model. The focus is not only on correcting the offending behavior, but also on correcting the cognitive distortions or "thinking errors" that cause the behavior.

✓ **Capital Offender:** Initially, this treatment was exclusively for juveniles who committed homicide, but has expanded to those sentenced for serious, chronic and violent offenses. Treatment is designed to help juveniles understand the seriousness of their actions and identify ways to cope with the feelings that trigger dangerous behavior.

✓ **Chemical Dependency:** This treatment differs from "substance abuse education" in that it is considered a special need requiring therapy under the direction of a licensed addictions counselor. Components include chemical dependency education, group and individual counseling, and living and social skills training. Juveniles examine their life and offense histories, and relapse cycles. Delinquent behavior is addressed through linking the dynamics of addiction to the juvenile's life history, offense cycle, and success plan.

✓ **Art Therapy:** A form of psychotherapy in which juveniles are encouraged to create some form of artwork such as a drawing, clay sculpture, collage, or other forms of art. These techniques do not necessarily require any special talent, experience, or training in the arts.

✓ **Emotional Disturbance:** Treatment designed for juveniles who have been clinically diagnosed with severe emotional and/or mental illnesses and require specialized treatment under the supervision of qualified clinical staff. Treatment focuses on interactions with others, e.g., family, school, and community. The immediate goal is behavior management. Intermediate goals address the juvenile's offense history and emotional problems, and the extended goals address family and community issues.

✓ **Therapeutic Horsemanship:** Other terms used are "Therapeutic Riding" or "Equestrian Program." This treatment program includes horseback riding for the disabled. It combines instructions for traditional horsemanship skills with concepts of physical therapy to improve the strength, balance, and self-esteem of physically and mentally disabled young juveniles. The ultimate goal is to encourage lifelong leisure activities and to promote good physical health and self-esteem to assist the juvenile in the community.

✓ **Mental Illness:** Treatment is designed to serve a juvenile population that has been diagnosed by a psychiatrist and determined to have a form of mental illness requiring medical and psychological oversight, especially in monitoring psychotropic medications.

✓ **Mental Competency Restoration:** Programs and/or treatments serving juveniles who are unable to grasp the basic understanding of information, instruction, or everyday activities and who require individualized instructions to assist in their comprehension of basic concepts. For example, a juvenile may be placed in such a program by the court, so he or she can understand court proceedings.

PROGRAMS

✓ **Education:** Educational programs must be designed for juveniles subject to the School Compulsory Attendance Laws by providing a minimum of four hours of school each week day, 12 months per year. Education must be provided by teachers with appropriate credentials and/or licensing in an environment that is conducive to learning.

If a juvenile is diagnosed with a learning disability, the contractor must ensure that an Individualized Educational Plan (IEP) is incorporated into the juvenile's Individualized Program Plan (IPP), in accordance with the requirements of the **Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.**

✓ **Vocational Training:** Vocational training provides juveniles who satisfy the educational age requirement with certification in a particular vocation. Emphasis must be placed on preparing the juvenile for future employment based on local, regional and national job markets. Such training may be integrated into a juvenile's educational plan.

✓ **Counseling and Psychological Services:** Programs provide counseling and psychological services consistent with the needs of each juvenile based on assessments and/or a clinical diagnosis by a licensed clinician/therapist. Case managers must assess a juvenile's progress or lack of progress through regularly scheduled individualized and group counseling sessions.

✓ **Structured Recreational Activities:** Programs must provide juveniles with opportunities for large muscle exercise and structured recreational activities which may include, but are not limited to supervised indoor and outdoor sports, table games and hobby crafts.

✓ **Religious Services:** Programs must provide access to religious services and activities subject only to the limitations necessary to maintain the facility's order and security. Provisions should be made to accommodate all universally recognized religions, and to afford access to appropriate facilities, members of the clergy, Native American medicine men or spiritual advisors, publications and religious symbols, and/or opportunities to adhere to dietary, holy day, and other requirements of various faiths. Such provisions should include accessible and private space for spiritual leaders and religious consultants to conduct pastoral counseling with juvenile offenders.

✓ **Cultural Services:** Programs must provide opportunities for juveniles to participate in activities that encourage appreciation and awareness of their culture and those of other juveniles with the goal of promoting self-image. For example, Native Americans are encouraged to participate in ceremonies and interact with tribal elders, provided these activities do not interfere with the safe operations of the facility.

✓ **Financial Responsibility:** Although offenders sentenced the Federal Juvenile Delinquency Act are not usually fined, some offenders with adult sentences may be housed in juvenile facilities because of age. Programs must provide those juveniles with an opportunity to develop a financial plan for satisfying legitimate financial obligations.

✓ **Substance Abuse:** Programs must provide, at a minimum, 30 hours of substance abuse education for all juveniles. Substance abuse education is not a substitute for chemical dependency treatment. Although videos may supplement the educational aspects, it is not considered a substitute for an actual instructor who promotes juvenile interaction and discussion on different topics related to substance abuse.

✓ **Employment:** Programs must prepare eligible juveniles to enter the world of work by participating in a job readiness curriculum that focuses on teaching skills such as: preparing resumes, completing job applications, interviewing techniques and establishing good work habits. Such curriculum may include, but not limited to, participation in mock job fairs and employment interviews.

✓ **Community Service:** Programs may consider appropriate juveniles for escorted trips to the community for the purpose of participating in community service projects that are unpaid and benefit the community. Community service projects such as Adopt-A-Highway and Special Olympics are usually compliment programming offered by non-secure, community-based residential facilities.

OTHER SERVICES

✓ **Independent Living Preparation:** Programs must provide an Independent Living Preparation Course for juveniles who meet the educational requirements. This course may supplement other educational opportunities, but should not be considered a substitute for formal education, especially for juveniles who are required to attend school due to the mandatory school age. The course consists of training modules that prepares the juvenile for an easier transition back to the community and stresses the importance of engaging in constructive activities such as employment, volunteer work and community service.

Modules must enable juveniles to acquire various skills, and should include, but not be limited to: career development and employment, financial responsibility and money management, health education, cognitive skills, crime victim awareness, parenting

skills, and problem-solving especially with regard to gang recruitment.

✓ **College Preparatory Courses:** Programs who provide for juveniles with high level diplomas or GEDs must provide access to advanced educational courses designed to prepare juveniles for post high school educational opportunities on a case-by-case basis.

✓ **Long Distance Learning:** This technology-based educational component supplements actual classroom instructions via video programming and satellite networking with institutions of higher learning. Ordinarily this approach is utilized for juveniles taking advanced college courses in secure programs, but may also be utilized to enhance educational instruction in community-based residential programs.

✓ **Ropes Course:** Physical programs designed to build teamwork, communication, self-esteem and reliance, and achievement. Ropes courses must be certified for safety by appropriate agencies. Additionally, constant and direct staff supervision is required to ensure juvenile and staff safety.

✓ **Parenting Course:** This curriculum is especially designed to prepare juveniles in accepting responsibility for their present or future role as a parent. Modules may include: sex education, child development and care, parental discipline, family planning, separation issues and marriage enrichment.
